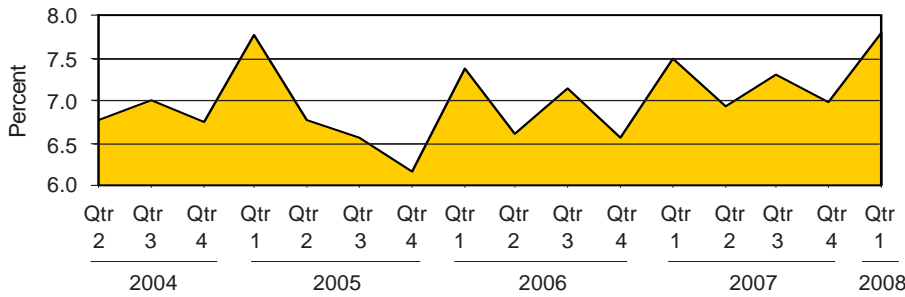




Michigan's Unemployment Rate

(not seasonally adjusted)



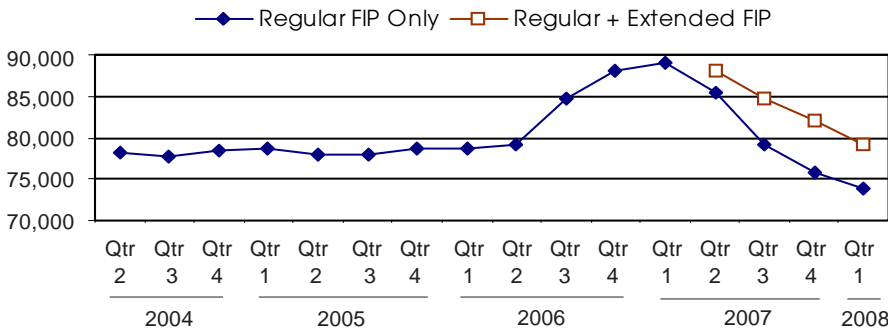

Regular FIP Cases Fall to Their Lowest Level in Five Years

Unemployment

The unemployment rate during Quarter 1 of 2008 was at its highest in three years (7.8), with 28 counties showing a rate of more than 10 percent. Motor vehicle parts manufacturing continued to be the hardest-hit industry, with a loss of approximately 16,500 jobs since the same time in 2007.

Over the Past Four Years

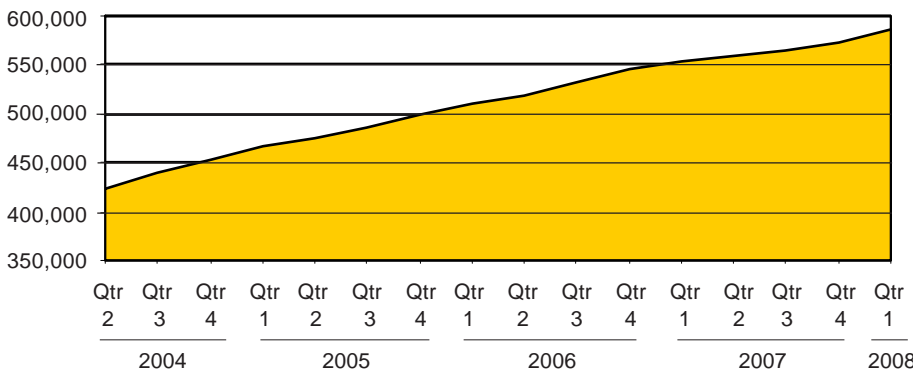

Public Assistance


The monthly average number of FIP cases in the first quarter of 2008 fell below 80,000 for the first time in almost two years. However, this total includes both Regular FIP and Extended FIP (the latter pays families ten dollars per month for up to six months after they leave the regular FIP program for reasons of employment). When counting only Regular FIP recipients, the average for Quarter 1 of 2008 was 73,739—its lowest level in five years and the largest drop from the previous year (17%) in at least eight years.

Meanwhile, Food Assistance caseloads continued to rise, reaching 585,773 statewide. All counties experienced an increase in caseloads during the past year, and Isabella County increased by more than 23 percent. Medicaid eligibility saw only a slight increase over the first quarter last year, though Macomb County increased its Medicaid-eligibles by 10 percent. In Lake County, nearly 25 percent of the population is eligible for Medicaid.

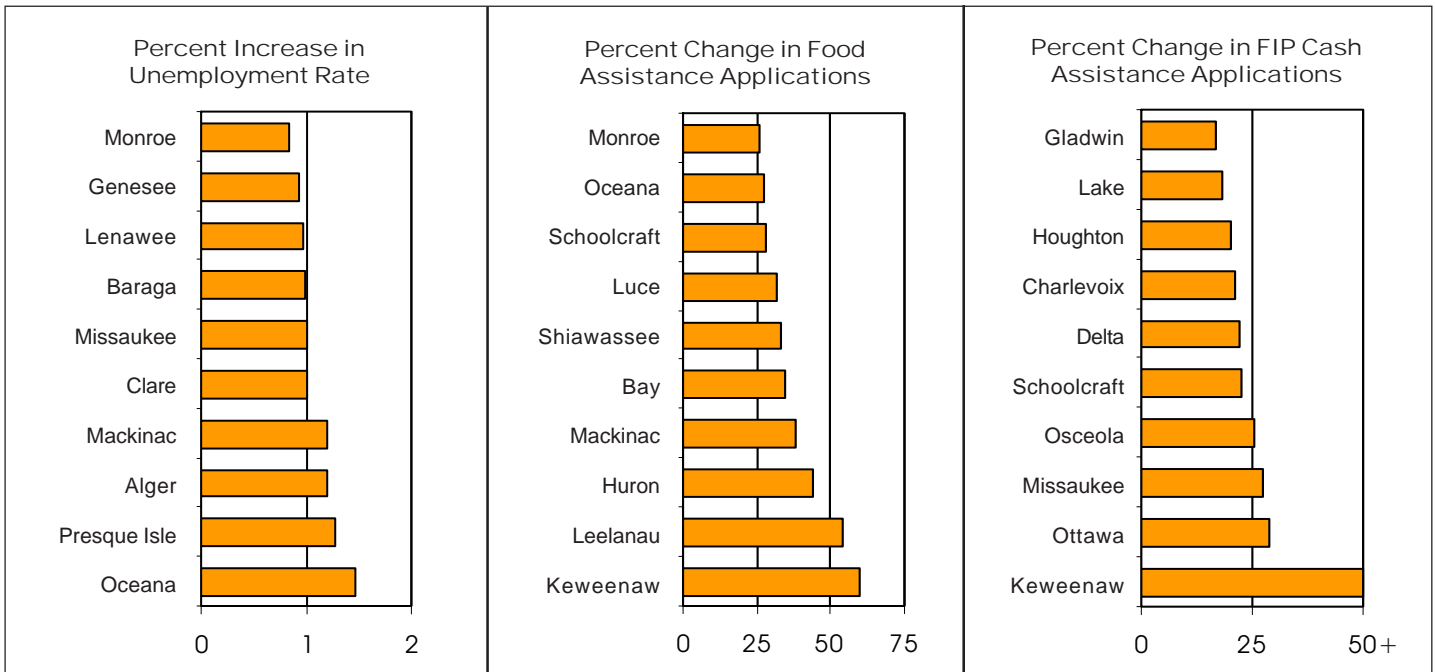
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Percentage Change in Michigan Counties With Largest Increases
